February 14, 2014 will be a significant landmark in the history of the Charlotte White Center.

It marks the 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our founding. In March of 1979, after a month of planning and renovations, Charlotte White and I cut the ribbon to open the day program to which she so generously lent her name. We began our services in the bottom floor of the Masonic Temple building in Dover-Foxcroft with fifteen participants in the day treatment program and a staff of four. Today we serve over twelve hundred individuals and families annually including ninety-six residents in the mix of our housing and residential support programs and twenty-five other service offerings delivered with a staff of nearly five hundred.

As we have grown through the years, we have met and overcome many challenges. We have been aided and supported in this journey by hundreds of kind supporters and concerned citizens. We have been able to create possibilities and opportunities to develop and deliver social service and healthcare programs to some of Maine's most vulnerable citizens in one of the poorest regions of the state. We have been invited to partner with courageous individuals as they faced their own struggles to transform their lives to align with their personal needs and goals.

Our own motivation emerges from our compassion and our caring. We know the richest moments of humanity are not when we seek to save ourselves but when we seek to save each other. As much as we need to pay attention to it, we have never been driven solely by the bottom line. And the truth is told in the many, many lives we have been fortunate enough to touch and to help over the years. Wolf Wolfensberger, a great philosopher, once wrote regarding the dignity of risk, "If you cannot fail, you cannot succeed". We have taken that truth to heart at the Charlotte White Center and its principle of promoting choice and independence has been the ethical mantra which we live by daily.

There is one thing the Charlotte White Center succeeds in exceedingly well: planting seeds of trust within the minds and hearts of those who are seeking that connection with us. When those planted seeds begin to flourish and grow, the most amazing transformations can occur. This is what makes us who we are. We provide the template for people to paint new pictures of the possible and then we support them in achieving the vision of that intention. We encourage people as, Thomas Merton noted, "to make choices that are based on the ability to become more living; more humane; and more involved in life." Powerful choices people can make at any time in their lives.

Over the last year, we have been engaged in several new initiatives. We were able to create strong partnerships with DHHS; Community Housing of Maine; Disability Rights Center and the plaintiffs in the Maine Equal Justice Partners waiver petition. This resulted in the opening of Knights Court, a seven unit apartment facility in Bangor for adults with special healthcare needs. We opened a new two bed residential facility in Bangor for adults with intellectual disabilities and will be opening a new four bed home for adults in recovery from behavioral health challenges. We are collaborating with Acadia Hospital to provide psychiatric services in Piscataquis via telemedicine and we have expanded our school based Counseling services to include both Guilford and Greenville.

We have secured two significant grants from the Maine Health Access Foundation. One grant will allow the Charlotte White Center, in coordination with other health care providers, to pursue the option of transforming some of our case management systems into a new model for integrated care as a Behavioral Health Home. A second grant was also recently awarded to CWC to aid seniors and people with disabilities or significant medical needs to "thrive across the continuum of care".

We now offer four career tracks for new and veteran staff including credentialed programs for Direct Support Professionals, Behavioral Health Professionals, Mental Health Rehabilitation Technicians Level I and MHRT-Community Level II. These are lifelong career trainings and credentialing. We also employ over one hundred staff between the ages of 18 to 35. This directly impacts and reverses the effects of the concept "rural brain drain" when young people with talents and skill must move away from rural areas in search of work, thereby weakening the economic life of the areas from which they depart.

Our donor base has expanded over the last year as well as more and more people becoming acquainted to the importance and the long lasting value of our mission. It does take a village, a really big village, to make this all work and we could not achieve the stability and long term objectives to improve the lives of those we support without a wide range of community support.

For thirty-five years, the Charlotte White Center has stood as a beacon of hope and opportunity for people seeking a partner in expressing their voice and in gaining choice and independence in their lives. Our mission of service calls upon us to assist those who are disenfranchised and those striving for a quality of life. While the light from that beacon is now subject to threats on many fronts, our core values of compassion and caring help us thrive and survive and continue our mission. We are creating pathways to hope and opportunity during troubled and confusing times. We know we can be at our best when times are at their worst. This is the essence of the Charlotte White Center. We shall endure.




